As a 21st Century Scholar, your child must successfully complete the Scholar Success Program.

What is the Scholar Success Program?

The Scholar Success Program helps prepare your child for college and career success while staying on track to earn and maintain their 21st Century Scholarship by using ScholarTrack. The 21st Century Scholarship helps pay tuition, or the cost of attending classes, at Indiana colleges and universities.

What is ScholarTrack?

ScholarTrack is a tool that Scholars use to track their completion of the Scholar Success Program. In high school, each grade has different required program activities that need to be completed by June 30 of that school year. 21st CENTURY SCHOLAR PLEDGE REQUIREMENTS

As a 21st Century Scholar, you have taken the Scholar Pledge to meet the following requirements:

- ✓ Complete the Scholar Success Program in high school and in college, which includes activities each year to help you stay on track for college and career success. The chart below shows the 12 activities that you must complete by high school graduation.
- ✓ Graduate from a state-accredited high school with a minimum of a Core 40 diploma and a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale.
- ✓ File the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by April 15 as a high school senior and each year thereafter until you graduate from college.
- Apply to an eligible Indiana college as a high school senior, and enroll in college as a full-time student within one year of high school graduation.

The **Scholar Success Program** includes activities that will help you stay on track for college and career success.

- Maintain Satisfactory Academic
 Progress (SAP) standards established

- Do not use illegal drugs, commit a crime or delinquent act or consume alcohol before reaching the legal drinking age.
- All grade-level activities must be completed by June 30 following the end of the school year.

Submit your College Application

You won't be going to college if you don't first apply to attend. Here you'll choose the college you want to attend, get everything together for your application and apply!



Watch "College Success 101"

From explaining things like registering for classes and getting your books to where to eat and how to get involved on campus, "College Success 101" can help you navigate the questions you might have about college life.



File your FAFSA

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid is how the federal government determines how much financial assistance you may be eligible for. You'll need to fill it out to receive any financial aid from your school, including your 21st Century Scholarship.

STAY ON TRACK WITH SCHOLARTRACK

ScholarTrack is an online tool that will guide you through the Scholar Success Program. You'll be able to manage your progress throughout high school and college and find resources to help you complete the requirements.

Keep your contact information updated

Each year, you will receive information and resources to help you stay on track. If your contact information changes or you change schools, log in to your ScholarTrack account and make the necessary updates.

Don't have a computer?

If you do not have a computer with internet access at home, use a computer at school, a public library, friend's house or talk to a parent or teacher/counselor for help finding internet access. ScholarTrack is also available on your smartphone.

GET STARTED

Go to ScholarTrack. IN.gov. Register for an account and select "I am a student." Students should be prepared to enter their name, date of birth, email address and Social Security Number (SSN) or Scholar ID.

CREATE AN ACCOUNT

Students can create a full or limited account. Full accounts, which require a SSN, grant access to all of ScholarTrack. Limited accounts, which require a Scholar ID, only grant access to the Scholar Success Program. Upgrade to a full account by adding a SSN at any time.

START TRACKING

From the dashboard, select "Scholar Success Program" under the "State Aid Resources" tab and complete the required Scholar Success Program activities in each grade of high school.

Submit your **College Application**

Applying to a perspective school is one of the biggest steps you'll take to achieve your career goals.

Where should I start?

To start the process, you'll need to create a short list of schools you want to attend. After you have an idea of the schools you want to attend,

1. Make a list of application deadlines and requirements for each school you are interested in attending.

2. Meet with your school counselor to ensure you have met all the admissions requirements. Also, if you took AP or dual credit courses, talk to your counselor and visit TransferIN.net to learn how those will transfer.

The Application

While college applications vary, most have similar requirements. Below is a list of basic application requirements, but make sure to check with your specific school's needs.

BASIC INFORMATION. This includes things like your name, address, phone number and your parent or guardian's information.

OFFICAL TRANSCRIPT. You can request this from your school counselor or electronically for free using Parchment (exchange.parchment.com).

LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION. These may be from teachers, coaches, mentors or other adults in your life.

STANDARDIZED TEST SCORES. Depending on the school you are applying to, you may be asked to submit ACT or SAT scores.

ESSAY, PERSONAL STATEMENT OR WRITING SAMPLE. Your writing is one way for college admissions staff to get to know you personally.

- LOG IN to your ScholarTrack account at ScholarTrack.IN.gov and select "Scholar Success
- Program" under the "State Aid Resources" tab.

CLICK on "Visit a College Campus" and preview the questions you'll need to answer about your activity.

- **APPLY** to your short list of interested schools. Any time during the process, talk to your 3.
 - parent/guardian, counselor or school's admissions department if you have any questions.
- **RETURN** to your ScholarTrack account and follow steps 1 and 2 to submit your answers after 4. your campus visit.

Watch "College Success 101"

"College Success 101" prepares you for college - showing how you can succeed academically and get the most out of campus life.

What are examples of ways I can be successful in college?

TAKE A FULL SEMESTER OF CLASSES. You must complete 30 credit hours per academic year to remain eligible for your 21st Century Scholarship. Talk with your academic advisor for more information.

EXPLORE FIRST-YEAR PROGRAMS. These programs help new students settle into campus life and have meaningful college experiences.

GET INVOLVED ON CAMPUS. Joining a club, volunteering or finding an on-campus job are ways to meet new people and stay connected.

TAKE ADVANTAGE OF ON-CAMPUS RESOURCES. Schools have a variety of resources students can use. Visit Scholars.IN.gov/students/college to view the resources your school provides specifically for being a 21st Century Scholar.

File your FAFSA

Filing your Free Application for Federal Student Aid, or FAFSA, makes you eligible to receive your 21st Century Scholarship and other state, federal or college aid.

When does the FAFSA need to be completed?

The FAFSA opens on October 1, and the federal processor must receive all FASFA forms by April 15 to be eligible for Indiana state financial aid, including your 21st Century Scholarship. Remember that some colleges set financial aid deadlines earlier than **April 15.** Check with the financial aid offices at the schools you apply to for deadline information.

Getting everything ready

The FASFA takes approximately 30 minutes to fill out. Having all the information and documents you'll need ready will help make the process as smooth and efficient as possible.

- LOG IN to your ScholarTrack account at ScholarTrack.IN.gov and select "Scholar Success

- **3. FILE** your FAFSA by visiting **https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa**. Remember, you and your parent/guardian have sections to fill out.
- **RETURN** to your ScholarTrack account and follow steps 1 and 2 to submit your answers after completing your FAFSA.

FAQS

How do I maintain the Scholar Pledge and keep my scholarship?

To maintain eligibility for your scholarship, you must meet the following requirements:

- Complete the Scholar Success Program in high school and in college, which includes activities each year to help you stay on track for college and career success. High school activities should be completed by June 30 of your senior year.
- Graduate from a state-accredited high school with a minimum of a Core 40 diploma and a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale.
- File the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by April 15 as a high school senior and each year thereafter until you graduate from college.
- Apply to an eligible Indiana college as a high school senior, and enroll in college full time within one year of high school graduation.
- Maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) standards established by your college.
- Complete 30 credit hours each year you are in college to stay on track toward earning your degree on time.
- Do not use illegal drugs, commit a crime or delinquent act, or consume alcohol before reaching the legal drinking age.

What should I do if I change schools or my contact information changes?

It's important that you receive notifications and updates from the 21st Century Scholars program to make sure you're on track to complete the requirements in high school and in college. Update your information in your ScholarTrack account at **ScholarTrack.IN.gov**.

Do I have to file the FAFSA every year in high school?

No. You must complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) during your senior or last year of high school and each year (minus your last year) that you are enrolled in college.

If I graduate early, can I still use the 21st Century Scholarship?

Yes. If you plan to graduate following your junior year, you need to notify your school counselor so they can inform the 21st Century Scholars program. You should complete all 12 high school Scholar Success Program activities, including filing the FAFSA by April 15 of your junior year. If you plan to graduate early, learn about the Mitch Daniels Early Graduation Scholarship at LearnMoreIndiana.org/ statefinancialaid.

Can I use my scholarship to pay for dual-credit classes while in high school?

No. The scholarship is only available once you have graduated high school.

If my GPA falls below 2.5 for a semester, will I lose the scholarship?

You are still eligible for your scholarship as long as your cumulative GPA is at least 2.5 on a 4 point scale at the time of graduation. A cumulative GPA is the average of all your grades during all your semesters of high school.

Can I receive the scholarship if I complete a high school equivalency exam (like a GED or TASC) or complete home school?

No. You must graduate with at least a Core 40 diploma from an eligible high school recognized by the Indiana Department of Education.

What happens if I don't complete the Scholar Success Program on time?

You must verify you've completed the three grade-specific activities via ScholarTrack by June 30 of each academic year. Your scholarship cannot be awarded until all activities are complete.

Am I still eligible for my scholarship if I take a gap year?

Yes, but you must be enrolled in a post-secondary education institution no later than a year after you graduate high school.
